The majority of my work is still in Ireland, so I commute there to oversee projects once a month. We specialise in private residential homes, but I have also done some large-scale retail projects and recently finished an exciting renovation of a church in Dublin with an Irish architect, where we discovered some priceless tiled stations of the cross by the renowned Irish stained-glass artist Harry Clarke.
